A.C.C. Screen (Magazine of Amateur Ciné Club, Johannesburg) has a plea by a member, Colin Houston, for a library. Apparently the club used to have one which gradually faded from the scene. As Colin puts it: "After all, this is the information centre of any society; in our case the ACC is a Technical Society in a sense for, after all, producing a film is a technical operation, and the need for information is vital."

Technical books on photography are so expensive nowadays that it is difficult to understand why members of camera clubs do not form libraries as a worthwhile amenity.

Durban National Salon. A report received gives the news that 1 183 slides have been received for this salon, consisting of 401 Nature, and 782 Pictorial. This is a record for the Salon.

From Camera Club of Johannesburg comes news that one of their most active members, also an active PSSAer, Roel Roelofsen, has succeeded in passing his century of International Salon acceptances for 1971, in just the six months that have passed (January 1st to June 30th 1971). He has scored 103 acceptances including 15 Honourable Mentions, one Bronze Plague, one Silver Trophy, one Silver Shield. This must be a record for a South African, and if it isn't perhaps a reader who has heard of a better would kindly let me know! For those who are always a little wary of sending their slides abroad, Roel says of all the slides he has sent over this year only one lot of three got mislaid and there is still a possibility of them pitching up, which is under a two-percent risk. I personally haven't lost a slide yet, so this hazard should not be a deterrent to any would-be exhibitors. Practically all the PSA recognised salons are run efficiently and take a lot of care of entries, particularly those from overseas.

From "The Picturemaker" (Mashonaland Film Society) an interesting little ad: "Wanted. The oldest film of Salisbury. . . Dig down in those archives folks and bring up a real oldy."

Camera Club of Johannesburg has been devoting their outings lately to photographing Old Johannesburg so that some of the old buildings are recorded before they are demolished. On one outing a group of mixed Print and Colour slide workers arrived at a building the very day before it was to fall under the demolishers' hammers.

Talking About Outings... the most regular expeditions in the field are those of Capetown Photographic Society. Their latest outing sounds really interesting. Here is the report on it culled from their July magazine. I quote: "The May outing was something quite out of the ordinary when some seventeen cars went to Paarl where Ethel and Reinie Rosenstrauch had organised for us to be taken around the Arboretum by no other celebrity than the man who had planned this memorial to the 300 years of the settlement of the Cape — Mr. Scheltens, one time chief gardener to the City of Cape Town.

"Every tree had a story and every story proved more fascinating than the one we had heard a little way back, with the result that we only saw a portion of this wonderful garden which is planned in continents. The Arboretum is not open to the public yet but what a lot of pleasure it is going to give to lots of people in the future!

"In the afternoon we went to the Old Museum which had been specially opened for us. Some of us became so fascinated at the most interesting way Mrs. Wells, the curator, told us about the treasures that had been collected that we forgot we had cameras for recording purposes. A wonderful and interesting day."
