A bold challenge . . .

... has been thrown out to members of the S.A.B.S. Camera Club. The search is on for a club insignia suitable for lapel, labels and letterheads ... and the rest. This smacks of professional 'image building' and is to be applauded. They're looking for a design which is bold, distinctive and can be used for a variety of purposes. "Since the badge will be the external emblem of the club let us have some good designs which we can wear with pride" says Chairman Eric Duligal in a recent issue of the club's magazine "Iris". I couldn't agree more

and I hope all those with an artistic and creative bent in the club will come up with something really good.

Ready . . . aim . . . fire . . .

. . that's what Mr. Les Clarke says when he's out doing some lip-synch filming. His home-developed system was described in a recent edition of "Pixit", bouncing journal of the Pretoria Cinematography Club. His method enables short bursts of lip-synch filming to be conducted. A portable tape recorder is set up and all the lip-synch shots posed - in other words, the camera, microphone and other gadgets are set and the speaker introduced. The tape recorder is started and then Les fires a toy pistol to record a reference point on the tape. (That's a change from the old clapper board if you like.) The camera is then started one second after the shot. Once the film has been processed and striped, and everything is ready for the transfer of sound from tape to stripe, Les loads the film into the projector in such a way that 18 frames of leader (one second) pass through the gate before the first frame of the lip-synch scene arrives. The tape recorder is then started and one second after the pistol shot is heard the projector is switched on. Phew! Les deserves a medal.

A Kiwi Contest

The Waikato Photographic Society (Inc.) of Hamilton, New Zealand, is holding their 11th New Zealand International Sound Slide Exhibition in July, 1972. The information comes to me from Springs, Transvaal — from the typewriter of Lex Liston (A.P.S.) S.A. who is Hon. Secretary of the Springs Colour Slide Club. As many P.S.S.A. members know, Lex was the Director of the Republic's first International Series Salon way back in 1968 and has been in touch with the Kiwis ever since. Our friends out in New Zealand need our support — let's show them that photography makes and keeps friends no matter what the distance is. I may be wrong, but with the high quality slide series that are doing the rounds in South Africa at present, the old orange, white and blue should be in a prominent position at the Waikato International Exhibition in a few months time. Welkom Salon 'best ever' ...

... that was the general opinion among the crowds who attended the big photographic event at Welkom recently. The number of entries from slide enthusiasts exceeded all previous records and for the first time the Orange Free State has received more colour slide entries in a competition than any other province. Guests of honour were Mr. Peter du Toit, Hon. P.S.S.A., President of P.S.S.A., and Mrs. du Toit who attended the prize-giving.

Those who attended the Salon — and there were many who travelled long distances, such is the enthusiasm among amateur photographers in South Africa —saw an excellent programme of 8 mm and 16 mm ciné films as well as colour slides. An innovation was the provision of neon lighting for illuminating prints. In addition, the 16 mm films were screened from the gallery of the hall, which eliminated the old bug-bear of projector stands and equipment in the centre of the hall.
