From the President's pen . . .

Dear Member,

This year started with us running at speed! There is more than one way in which to improve yourself in PSSA. Jill Sneesby has kindly put together a article on salons and diamond ratings and DPSSA.

SALONS – DIAMOND RATINGS and DPSSA (by Jill Sneesby)

In order to be promoted from 3 to 4 star and higher one of the requirements is that you achieve a certain number of salon acceptances. You have to enter your images into Salons, and only a small percentage of entries are accepted – between 20 & 25% of the entries in digital. So, when you do get acceptances you should be very proud of yourself.

If you are just starting out look out for the Up and Coming Salons which are only open to members up to 3 Star, which does make it easier as you are not competing against honours workers.

Other than needing these acceptances for promotion they also count towards PSSA Diamond Rating Awards and the DPSSA and SPSSA. You don't need to be a member of PSSA in order to apply for 1,2 & 3 diamond ratings but once you get that far you will be ready to join. All acceptances are cumulative so you can start anytime and just keep on adding to your totals.

There are 3 categories – Colour Open, Mono Open & Nature and all the sections are divided amongst those 3 and when you apply it is one of those three categories.

Take for instance the Tafelberg Salon which closes early in Feb – it has 6 digital sections

Visual Art – Colour

Landscapes - Colour

Open - Colour

Open - Monochrome

Human Portraits - Monochrome

Wildlife - Colour

For your Diamond Ratings acceptances from 3 of those sections would count in the Colour Open category, namely Visual Art, Landscapes and Open Colour,

2 sections would count in the Mono Open category, namely Open Mono & Human Portraits.

1 section would count towards Nature.

Once you have 15 acceptances in one category you can apply for a 1 Diamond Rating. The requirements go up as you aim higher and the first big milestone is 125 Acceptances in one category which will give you a DPSSA which you can write after your name.

If you do enter in all three categories you can apply for your Diamond Rating in all three and when you have 3 x DPSSA then you will get a DPSSA(Vers) – with Vers standing for Versatility.

All you need to do to get started on your journey is enter saloons and make sure that you keep good records of your results.

Titles of images

How important is the TITLE of the image when you submit it for club judging?

In the club we have generally not announced the title until after an image has been judged, working on the belief that an image should speak for itself. While this is true most of the time there are some images that definitely benefit from knowing the title beforehand and in some instances it can make the difference between success and failure.

Alison Duncan's image that she submitted in December was one such example. Without the title the judges had no idea what Alison was aiming at – but with the title - Refused Proposal at Spitzkoppe – the image suddenly made a lot more sense. That doesn't mean it would have necessarily achieved a higher score but knowing the title did put it into context.



When the images are judged remotely the judges do get the titles on the spreadsheet they use for scoring and therefore do know the titles when judging. In order to make sure all the judges have the same information, we are, in future, going to announce the titles at the club judging prior to the judges scoring.

As some of you will have already entered for February by the time you read this we are only going to introduce this as from the March meeting. Remember, you are not being scored on your title, so do not worry if your titles are plain and simple, the image will always be what is most important.



Set Subjects explained

In order to stimulate and give members a photographic purpose, 12 prescribed subjects are set for each year. One of your three entries per month may be entered into the set subject category.

Scoring and commenting is done as for open judging and the awards received are added to the club and personal logs. In addition, a winner and runner-up are chosen by the judges and the winner receives 3 points and the runner-up receives 2 points on the set subject log. All those entering receive 1 point on the set subject log.

Images may be either Black & White or colour and manipulation is allowed (unless otherwise stated). Where no definition is given you are free to interpret the subject as you wish while still paying attention to the topic.

Set Subjects for 2022-2023

Month	Category	Description	Manipulation allowed or not
January 2023	Portrait	A likeness, personality and mood of a living subject where that subject is dominant in the image. Portraiture is not restricted to head and shoulders and may include just a part of the face, a back view or even a full-length study. COMPLETE	Yes
February 2023	Marine (Seascape)	An image which depicts the sea. It can include the shoreline.	Yes
March 2023	High key	An image that is almost entirely very bright with very little or no dark shadows present. This is usually a creative decision made by the photographer, in order to create a certain mood in the image.	
April 2023	Challenge	Your version of an "old master's " work. e.g. Ansel Adams / Henri Cartier- Bresson/Philippe L Gross	Yes

Robert Doisneau

Robert Doisneau (14 April 1912 – 1 April 1994) was a French photographer. From the 1930s, he photographed the streets of Paris. He was a champion of humanist photography and with Henri Cartier-Bresson a pioneer of photojournalism.

Doisneau is known for his 1950 image "Le baiser de l'hôtel de ville" (The Kiss by the City Hall), a photograph of a couple kissing on a busy Parisian street.



Vivian Maier

She was born in New York City in 1926, the daughter of a French mother, Maria Jaussaud Justin, and an Austrian father, Charles Maier (also known as Wilhelm). Died 2009. Better known as the childrens' nanny.

In 1951, aged 25, Maier moved from France to New York, where she worked in a sweatshop. She moved to the Chicago's North Shore area in 1956, where she worked primarily as a nanny and carer for the next 40 years.

She took more than 150,000 photographs during her lifetime, primarily of the people and architecture of Chicago, New York City, and Los Angeles, although she also travelled and photographed worldwide.



Saul Leiter

Saul Leiter (December 3, 1923 – November 26, 2013) was an American photographer and painter whose early work in the 1940s and 1950s was an important contribution to what came to be recognized as the New York school of photography.

He is well known for his fashion photography having done shoot in colour in the late 1950's and 1960's. Work done for Harpers Bazaar, Elle, Vintage Vogue, Show, Queen and Nova.
