

Set Subject for March - Architecture (B&W Meeting Only)

The HPS writeup states: "From skyscrapers to Gothic gargoyles, from bridges to bricks, this genre requires selecting an interesting vantage point, and coming up with an intriguing view."

OK – Where are we going here?

The definition of the word "architecture" is, in reality, "the art and technique of designing and building something, as distinguished from the skills associated with the construction thereof." This does not only include brick and mortar. My son specialises in the design of computer architecture for electronic banking systems. Nothing to do with civil works! However, architecture is generally taken to mean, referring to buildings.

The definition of the noun "building" is equally vague. Many definitions mention walls and a roof. Few bridges these days have roofs!

Furthermore, there is a subtle difference between Architectural Photography, and Fine Art Photography of architectural subjects. Architectural photography attempts to make

images that provide an accurate view of a piece of architecture. In fine art photography of architecture, the details are less important than the making of an interesting photograph.

Another area of doubt arises out of Sculpture vs. Architecture. When one thinks about the soapstone carving on your mantlepiece, that is clearly not architecture. However, by the time you get to the Statue of Liberty, that is an architectural piece rather than a sculpture. But in between these two, are a myriad of examples where the distinction is not so clear.

So, my idea behind this particular set-subject, is to focus on the fine art photography of civil engineering structures of some sort. "Civil structure" includes concrete, buildings, dam walls, bricks, steelwork, glass, etc.

When I think about this subject, relative to B&W images, two well know photographers immediately come to my mind: Sharon Tenenbaum and Julia Anna Gospodarou. (I suppose that I might also add David Osborne, although many of his images were not strictly monochrome.)

The following are some examples that come from Google searches, mainly looking at the works of the abovementioned photographers.



Here we have a cityscape, surely taken in Amsterdam. The reflection helps to show that many of the buildings are not actually vertical. This happens frequently in that city; and this forces one to take a second look, in order to work out what exactly is wrong!

Here we have an interesting shot looking up at an office block structure. To me, it is amazing how the architect managed to get that single black line going up through all of the floor levels.

This certainly makes for an interesting composition, although it may have been possible to adjust some of the tones to improve the overall effect.



This is a shot of Paris, showing the Arc de Triomphe, with the radial streets that lead to it.

Perhaps not an image that would be labeled "architectural", but it did appear in a search for such subject matter.





The interior of buildings can make for interesting photographs.

This shot of multiple arches is really beautiful.

I attempted to run down the originator of this image, without too much success. It originally appears to have been posted by an architectural design firm in Italy. It may be an AI generated image, as the details of the floor brickwork look a little bit unrealistic.

Another shot of multiple arches of the Milwaukee Art Museum, photographed by Sharon Tenenbaum. A real beauty!

You can be fairly certain that a lot of post-processing went into this result.



Another of Sharon Tenenbaum's images; her award winning Porto Bridge #2 (Capilano Suspension Bridge).

In her eBook, Left & Right Brain: A photographer's understanding of how these mindsets affect our visual interpretation of Art, Sharon uses this image to describe how she first became fascinated with analyzing why people see things differently. She found that, flipping this image horizontally makes the photo less attractive to the average human eye.

She also touches on other topics of perception, including looking at possible differences that may be experienced by peoples whose languages are written from right to left.

An interesting read!

It is interesting to go through the images on this website; brings back many memories. However, one thing is clear. As with the set subject last year covering a "Murder Mystery Book Cover", the bulk of these movie posters are graphic works, rather than photographic works. Obviously, the HPS intention for this "Movie Title" set subject, is to base your entries on photographic works to a large extent.

Another problem with movie posters (from our point of view), is the amount of space that must be allowed for text. A real movie poster has to display who the actors are, who produced it, etc., etc. However, our entries to this set-subject do not necessarily need to have any text. In fact, I think that a photo that "might be used" for a poster is the main objective here. No?

Most movie posters are in portrait format, rather than landscape format. Again, I do not think that this is a constraint in our case.

Anyway, I did another Google search looking specifically for movie posters based on photographs, and came up with this page by Chase Jarvis:

Visit to Helderberg Motorcycle Museum

On Friday 5 January, 13 of us donned our fringed leathers and roared off to photograph the incredible machines at the newly opened Motor Cycle Museum and Vintage Bike Café on Old Sir Lowry's Pass Road.

.... Ok, I just wanted to grab your attention, we all arrived rather sedately in our cars, and actually got off to a somewhat shaky start when the Manageress got slightly spooked by all of us with our equipment despite me having got approval for our visit, confirmed and double confirmed with a different staff member. Anyway, common sense prevailed and we were allowed unrestricted access to click away to our hearts' content. Antenie, Helder, Stephen, Lorrain, Peter, Mari, Gavin, Denise, Hilldidge, Elizma, Steve, Wynand and I were all there to satisfy our post-Christmas need to pick up our cameras!

The collection is privately owned by Dave Neto who has spent many years collecting and restoring the bikes himself, bikes from America, France, Germany, Italy, England... so much memorabilia and so much history to enjoy, from a 1919 Ducati 'moped', a Harley Davidson Ice Cream vending trike, right up to modern day 'Superbikes'.





The interior of the building is a photo opportunity in itself, decorative laser cut metal panels form the mezzanine's balustrade and old oil cans, enamel garage signs and vintage helmets adorn the walls, along with fascinating old photos.

The museum has been put together with astonishing attention to detail and the atmosphere really helps the bikes to whisper their stories of the

'open road' as they rest, restored and celebrated by their owner and hopefully by all their visitors.

I think we all tried out the café's offerings, we ate when we were hungry and drifted back in and out of the museum as the pull to spend more time enjoying the bikes was undeniable. The toastie and chips I had were excellent and the coffee got a thumbs up from Hilldidge too.

The images made by different club members demonstrate the different styles of photography that we enjoy and the 'museum format' ie bikes displayed in such a way that it's nigh on impossible to get a 'clean' shot of any bike, meant that we had to challenge ourselves creatively to capture the details, angles and even the feelings evoked by the amazing collection.

You can visit the café for breakfast or a snack from 9am throughout the day, the kitchen closes at 4pm and the museum at 5pm.



Entry fee is R100 or R50 for pensioners, money well spent in my opinion. I'll definitely go back!

There are a few known photo opportunities coming up. Although these are not HPS club outings, you may want to consider going in any case.

Classic Car and Bike Show

After more than 20 years, the Classic Car and Bike Show has become a 'must do' on the Cape Town events calendar. The Show was conceived in 1999 and while the first Show, held in January 2000, featured only a handful of clubs, it was clear from the first that this was a winning formula. Over the next few years, the event grew steadily in popularity, both with exhibitors and members of the public.

In 2006, the decision was taken to increase the event from a single day event into a two day event and to include Modern and Future Classics on the Saturday with Vintage Classics remaining on the Sunday. This decision allowed the inclusion of more clubs and increased the field of interest to intrigue the younger generation.




The main purpose of this event is of course to raise funds and as it grows, so the ability to help others grows with it. In 2007, R10 000 was donated to Robertson House in aid of victims of spinal injuries and in 2008, R10 000 was donated to the SA Burn Foundation

towards the printing and distribution of their new "Learn Not to Burn" program for preand primary schools. In 2009, we were proud to be able to donate R10 000 to Tape Aids for the Blind, who we are sure will put the money to excellent use helping visually challenged people to keep entertained, educated and generally informed. Our 2010 charity was the Chaeli Campaign who also received R10 000 towards their amazing initiatives. 2011 saw us supporting Living Way, an outreach programme based near Kommetjie that teaches entrepreneurial skills in informal settlements. Our 2012 our main recipient was the Village Care Aged Fund in Lavender Hill who provide housing and care to at risk seniors in a difficult environment and in 2013 we selected the Nkosiyamoyethu Outreach Programme in Hout Bay, with our donation assisting them in skills training. In 2014 our charity was the Lucky Lucy Foundation and in 2015 we helped Age-in-Action. In 2016 we donated to SA Promise who are working to ensure that as many children as possible are educated in SA. For 2017, our donation was split between Wildfire Volunteer Services and Enviro Wildfire Services.

Since the resumption of the show "post COVID", in 2024 we hope to continue to support charities in need. Please help us continue to make the show the success that it always has been.

EDITOR'S COMMENT

Al Again

In 2023 I mentioned AI in quite a few Newsletters. Over the course of that year, there were a lot of changes in the AI world.

A few weeks ago, I prepared our annual budget. When I got to the line for "Photography", I hesitated, and thought hard about whether I should budget for some AI related expenses. I didn't. But now, a couple of weeks later, I'm starting to think I might have made an error there. I think I may need to revisit this line!

So, I decided to select AI as the topic for my comment yet again.

Let's start with Sam Altman. He is the computer geek who established OpenAI, a firm at the heart of the development of AI. OpenAI developed the well-known chatbot, ChatGPT. People started using this software to do marvelous things, and the whole AI surge started to really take off!

In May 2023, OpenAI CEO Altman testified before the US Senate Judiciary Subcommittee about the dangers of unregulated AI. (Some of you may have viewed this on CNN.) He subsequently did a bit of a world tour to give the rest of us a heads-up on the advantages and dangers of AI.

On Friday, 17 November, 2023, the Board of OpenAI decided to fire Altman, along with co-founder President, Greg Brockman! Over the ensuing weekend, Microsoft announced that Altman would be joining them to head up a new Microsoft AI research team. However, after learning about the firing, most of the staff of OpenAI immediately threatened to leave the firm. So, the following week, both Altman and Brockman were reinstated. Microsoft graciously accepted their loss.



The day before the famous firing, Sam Altman and Android Jones had a televised discussion concerning Al. Android Jones is an American digital and multimedia artist whose work focuses on fantasy and psychedelic art. The two of them had a similar meeting some time back; and Android had gone away from that meeting being a bit worried about Al putting him out of business. This November, 2023 meeting was a follow up talk, to discuss what had happened in the interim.

But wait; let's go back and look at that previous meeting, which took place at Burning Man 2022, in August/September of that year.

EDITOR'S COMMENT (CONTINUED)

Below is the link to the video covering the occasion. This is a long video (52 Minutes), but it's really worth viewing. You can understand how Android was really concerned about what AI was likely to do to his life. After all, he relied upon his proven artistic abilities to provide for his family.

Burning Man meeting between Sam Altman and Android Jones

So, here we are in November 2023 again, and Android has had a year more to play with the OpenAI software. What he ended up doing, was creating an AI model that would generate artworks based on his past artistic production. He built it so that the model would only use his work, it was not allowed to base its output on any other artist's work. He then made the model available to his loyal followers (i.e. those financially supporting his sites). The result is, his business seems to be going from strength to strength. He's now trying to create a "more authentic relationship" between himself, and the people who support him. (I assume that he is considering some sort of profit sharing scheme.)

Android no longer regards AI as a threat, but as a tool that will enable him to improve upon his output.

So, it looks as if we photographers might also be able to take advantage of AI to progress our artform. No? Well perhaps the next two examples may move your position a bit.

Next up – The solution to club judging?

I've always been a bit outspoken on the subject of club judging. One of the worst club judges I've experienced was an excellent photographer; but when she judged, she expected everyone to offer up the same standard, or else they would be mercilessly cut down.



On the other hand, on many occasions I've mentioned that, the best club judge I've ever come across is Nick Melidonis, although I have only seen him in action twice. He took a very gentle approach, pointing out the strengths, and merely suggesting possible changes as an afterthought.

However, who am I to talk, as I refuse to sit in judgement on anyone else's work in any case.

EDITOR'S COMMENT (CONTINUED)

I have previously mentioned Trey Ratcliff, who has been experimenting with AI image generation for some time. Late last year, Trey put out a video on the subject of AI judging of photographic images. What he did, was train ChatGPT Plus to comment on presented images, using Trey's own comments from his many judging sessions, and his published books.

Trey's Fun Photo Critique is available for free at this time. However, in order to use it, you require access to ChatGPT Plus, which will cost you a minimum of \$20.00 per month.

You will have noticed that the output of Trey's system is a bit flowery. But it does do well in highlighting the good points, and not alienating the photographer with silly criticisms. Now, what if we could get someone like Nick Melidonis to put together an AI system that would rapidly provide a similar comment on club photos?

Since Trey announced his Photo Critique system, I have found a few more such systems out there on the web. Once again, it is just a matter of time before AI takes over the job of monthly judging!

Finally - The Rise of Magnific

We have all heard about the new content aware fill that comes with Photoshop. Since I have an outdated version of Photoshop, I cannot try it out. But Blake Rudis at F64 Academy has been fiddling with this. Although enthusiastic about the principle, he finds the blurriness of the generated patches to be troublesome.

His solution is to combine it with Magnific, another AI program that I had not heard of previously.

Blake has published a video of how he took a landscape image that included a house that didn't quite match to his original vision; so he replaced it with a nice log cabin, with the help of Content Aware Fill and Magnific.

But. The point is, the amazing stuff that Magnific can do for any photo! Does this work as well as Blake seems to think it does? Can one reliably apply it to a whole image to fix problems like noise and blur, without having to do too much repair work afterwards?

In December 2022 I tried out a number of AI programs on deliberately underexposed night shots taken at high ISO (to get reasonable shutter speeds from a moving vessel). These were things like ON1 Photo Editor, Topaz Photo AI, and DXO Pure Raw. These programs did not solve the problems; I could still do better manually using my outdated versions of Photoshop and Topaz plugins. But, it's just a matter of time.

I took a look at a couple of recent videos featuring Magnific. There are still problems, including limiting the output to $4,400 \times 4,400$ pixels (about 20 Mpx.). But once again, it is just a matter of time. And time is not very long in the AI world!

Breaking News: Magnific today (17 January, 2024) announced that their output limit is now 10,000 x 10,000 pixels (about 100Mpx)!
