

# President's Page: Thelma van der Schyff Patterns Around Us

We are surrounded by patterns.

As I sit at my desk, I look around me and see files in a row on a shelf. I see tiles on the floor. I see the windowpanes in their frames. I see my grandchild's Lego blocks. I see colouring pencils in their box. Looking outside the window, I see identical chairs under the umbrella. All these things form a pattern, that is why it attracts my attention. All around us we can see architectural elements such as floors, walkways, stairways, brick walls or even man-made art.

Looking further, I see the little rose bush blooming. On closer inspection I see the intricate center inside the rose showing off its patterns. Nature is full of patterns. It shows in the veins of leaves, the repeating pattern of grass and other plants.


The four seasons—winter, spring, summer, and autumn —provide us with its own patterns. The skeleton of a tree in winter makes for lots of impact in a photo.






Similarly, spring comes with new growth and patterns. This is also found in vibrant colours that add to the drama in a photo.

Narrowing it down to day and night, the pattern that emerges of darkness followed by light makes for interesting images. Similarly, the light that falls through windows create beautiful patterns.



Just open your mind to start seeing what is around you. Think about all the swirls, waves or lines that abound all over our daily activities. Rock formations and erosion of earth form strong patterns.




Dunes form repeating curves, wind waves are sea surface waves that create the characteristic chaotic pattern of any large body of water.

Animals are great subjects showing us their patterns. A zebra has black and white stripes, while a leopard has spots. Some animals use their patterns for camouflage, while others use them for communication.



When having the opportunity to photograph the natural world, one never lacks inspiration - just get into the habit of looking and seeing. By filling the frame with your subject creates great patterns. It shows the hidden world that is often missed. You never know what is hidden from the casual eye, until you stoop and observe.



A beautiful example of spirals accentuated with colour. How great creation is seeing the nautilus shell or the chameleon's tail in detail.



Take this further, find snail shells, whirlpools, ferns and algae. Look at a cross section of red cabbage and you will see spirals. Look at your fingertip, where you would make a fingerprint, and you will see a spiral. Then the ultimate spiral – the stunning view of spiral galaxy M101, also known as the Pinwheel galaxy. (This might just be for admiring seeing that this captured by the Hubble Space Telescope.)



Go out and find patterns, patterns patterns.....

Get carried away.

### Articles: Minimalism - Linda Martin

This is not an easy way to photograph. The very word means LESS Minimalist photography is a form of photography that is distinguished by austere simplicity. It emphasizes sparseness and careful composition, shying away from overabundance of colour, patterns, or information. (Definition in Wikipedia)

Minimalist photography is about stripping a subject down to its most elegant essence. It is a way to create photos that cut through the clutter by emphasizing the essentials, including clean lines and empty spaces. Simplicity itself.

Negative space plays a huge part in the minimalist style. Since the idea is to remove all clutter and unnecessary elements to highlight just one subject, you are going to end up with an empty area around the subject. Where one can add texture or colours to fill a negative space and compliment the subject, in minimalism this is not ideal. Nothing must overpower the simplicity of the subject. Minimal art is the culmination of reductionist tendencies in modern art that first surfaced in the 1913 composition by the Russian painter Kasimir Malevich of a black square on a white ground.



This I feel is taking the whole thing to the point of crazy. I don't personally "get it" and as a photograph it won't get anywhere near a bronze.

This simplistic photo is a lot more pleasing, but I feel a bit of something small to balance the leaves on the right side would add value.

This is a lot better in my opinion, simple clean uncluttered shelf of vases beautifully balanced by the shadow of a window.

The minimalistic style can be applied to landscapes and architecture as well as still life. In fact, I have seen it applied to wildlife as well. I do feel that the subject needs to be at least identifiable in the vast plain of otherwise "nothingness". As far as composition goes, the rule of thirds works well. A leading line to the subject makes a small subject really stand out. And a sudden spot of colour draws the eye.



Using a very shallow Depth of Field will blur out distracting details in the background and leave a pleasing subtle colour behind the subject.

Going monochrome or severely reducing colours is another way to show up the simple subject without the confusion of colour.



Not all of this might be your style. It certainly does require another way of "looking" at the subject. Be careful of totally losing any sense in the photograph, the story can get forgotten or lost once you eliminate the clutter. Try to keep it real, have a subject that "says something". It needs a reason to be there even if not up close and personal.

Long exposure and Intentional Camera Movement can also create some stunning Minimalist photos. Just keep the colours muted and have something identifiable to pique the viewer's interest. A jumbled blur does not really work too well.

All in all, this form of photography is what a lot of "Fine Art" is based on. A photo one can look at for some time without suffering from sense overload.

### Panorama photography - Mike Smith

Panorama photography seems quite daunting, but in reality it is a lot easier than you think.

A panorama is basically a long thin photograph of a big scene. It could be a mountain range, a large lake or a huge vista. Just something that you might not be able to fit into one photo with the lens you have ... or you might have to shoot super wide and crop in on that photo, which is never a good thing as you would then be throwing away valuable pixels.

I think every photographer should be shooting panoramas ... and I'll let you in on a little secret ... they're not that hard to shoot!

I filmed this week's on location landscape photography video in <u>Pen Y Fan, in the Brecon Beacons</u>. It's an awesome place to visit and hike and gives you some spectacular views that are perfect for panoramas.



### 01. Principles of Photographing a Panorama

This is a technique whereby you take a series of photographs, and then afterwards merge them together in your editing program, to form one big photograph.

You can do a single row of photos, it could be as little as two merged together, or as many as you want ... although the more you throw into the mix, the harder your computer will work.

You can also do multiple rows of photos ... however it is easy to get carried away with this ... I have tried over a hundred just for fun, and my computer had a little bit of a sulk and refused to give me the image ... so just be aware of your computing power at home.

I have the M1 Mac Mini with minimal specs (8Gb Ram) and it takes about 3-5 minutes to stitch over 20 images together, so you can quite easily build a really big photo, with a relatively cheap computer.

### 02. The Basics of Taking the Photos for Your Panorama

To take a panorama photo all you need is a camera that has a manual mode setting:

- Set the camera to manual mode
- Set the ISO to 100

- dial in the settings for the conditions you have on the day (If you're not sure about this, see below)
- With the settings you have, check the brightest parts to make sure the highlights aren't blowing out (are too bright)
- focus on the scene, then set the camera to manual focus (in the image above, I've focussed on the mountain to the left)
- Start to take the photos one by one, I normally shoot from left to right. Make sure you stop all movement before taking each one.
- Overlap your photos by about half (So each photo has about half of the scene the last photo had in it)
- As long as there is a decent overlap, the computer will stitch them together successfully
- Shoot a bit wider than you think you will need. It is better to crop in afterward on your panorama, than to not have enough.

### 03. Check Your Photos for the Panorama

When you have finished, check all the photos in the sequence. I'll just make sure they are all sharp, in focus and have a decent overlap.

### 04. Editing Your Panorama Photo

I use Adobe lightroom classic but most editing programs are similar in the way they stitch your photos together.

- Import your photos into lightroom using the import button.
- Select all your photos in the pano you want to stitch together by clicking on the first one, and then holding down shift and selecting the last one.
- Right click on any one of the selected images.
- Select Photo Merge, and then Panorama.
- It may take a while to load up depending on your computer's performance.
- If they successfully stitch together, great job, **if not**, you probably didn't get enough of an overlap.
- In the popup window, select Cylindrical projection for single row panoramas and spherical projection for multi row panoramas.
- If the horizon is a but wavey, play with the boundary warp slider to try to straighten it out.
- Check Auto Crop and Click Merge
- If it is a big pano, you might want to go and grab a coffee and leave your computer to do it's thing ...
- Once done, edit as normal

### 05. Things to watch out for when stitching your panorama photographs together


• It will be a big image once stitched together, so just be patient if your computer is taking a while to build it ... also when editing, it will be a little slower.

This panorama below came out at 20,000 x 8,000 pixels, which is a 160 megapixel image! (Although to keep my website quick, I downsized it to 1000px wide.



• If the computer doesn't stitch them together successfully, you need to work on your overlap.





This shows the 7 single images I took for the panorama I photographed in the video.

If you look at these photos carefully, you can see most elements in the photographs are repeated in at least two of the photos. So with Cribyn, the peak in the middle, you can see the top of the mountain in photo 4 and photo 5.

I also shot a bit wider to the left to give me room to crop in post when determining the framing of the pano.



This is the final panorama from the 7 images above.

Panorama photographs are a great way to showcase a big landscape and if your wide angle lens isn't cutting it, or if it just looks unimpressive. Try getting out a longer focal length and shooting a panorama.

I do this all the time and love it when I get a good panorama, but just in knowing that the process is relatively easy, is a great way to give you confidence to start shooting your very own panoramas photos.

If you aren't sure about getting the right exposure in your camera, just put the camera in the auto mode and see what settings it gives you for the brightest part of the photo. Then copy these settings across to the manual mode setting and you are good to go.

This is actually a good way to get into <u>manual mode photography</u> as well ... let the auto mode or the aperture priority mode do all of the hard work, and then just copy it, and then think about why it chose those settings .... and if you have time have a play around with your camera settings to see how they change your photos.

As for needing a tripod or a specialised tripod head ... well I go deep into that idea in the video so make sure you watch it to see how I take most of my panoramic photographs.
