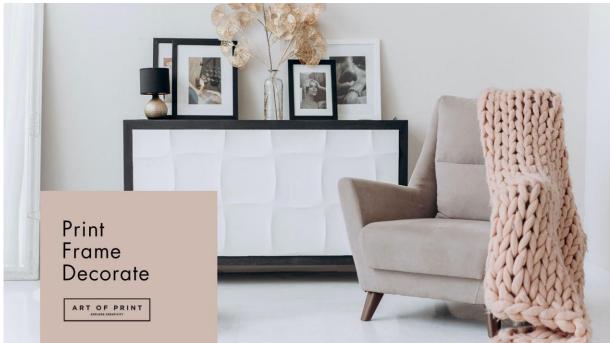

President's Page: Thelma van der Schyff One Candid President's Page

Living a forced or too organized life can be stifling and boring.

It is important to always know how to relax and find beauty in ordinary things. I try to do this in my own life, but must admit I am also a fan of lists, and then lists of lists.

When taking photos of an event, it usually requires some planning and organizing to be sure of a success.

I suppose that is why candid photography appeals to me. It is not staged or posed.

There is a sense of capturing a moment that is fleeting and won't come again.

When photographing a wedding, certain times and scenes need to be captured to get a flow of the day. However, you can let you eye wander and see where the bride left her shoes to one side after she danced the night away – facing different directions. The wedding cake can only have a few crumbs left on the table with a dirty knife. The champagne bottle can be upside down in the ice bucket. The bride and groom can be unguarded in their joy.



The beauty of candid photography is that you capture natural expressions and moments that might not be possible to reproduce in a studio or a posed photo in a photo shoot. Some common synonyms of "candid" are "frank, open, plain......" Candid suggests expression marked by sincerity and honesty. This is the opposite of portrait photography. When taking controlled portraits, the photographer has to guide the model/mom and baby/teenager to get them to engage with the camera. This can be difficult as the photographer already needs to have a very clear picture of what the subjects have to do. I must admit that I have always found it daunting to have somebody relying on me to tell them how to stand, sit or act. In candid photography there are related genres like street photography where you convey the idea that the subjects are unaware of the camera.

Street photography is fascinating. You are capturing people that are unaware that they are being photographed, so there is no posing. Look for the lady touching up her lipstick, the guy at the street café feeding his dog pieces of his bagel, or just the man reading his newspaper, with his cappuccino on the table nearly forgotten. A favourite of mine is when people watch themselves in store windows checking on their attire or hair.

These candid photographs break away from our never-ending and often exhausting pursuit of perfection. Candid shots capture the beauty of a natural moment. They give viewers the opportunity to relate to a particular emotion, environment or setting. It creates the urge to strive for more real and authentic photography.

My favourite is taking photos at a wedding, but not like the wedding photographer has to do. I like to take photos of the nephews greeting one another, of granny getting out of the car, of guests arriving, of the little niece who has just started walking, of the little boy who slept under table after being exhausted after a long day. Then I make a video with music from the wedding and give it to the family to pass along to whoever will be interested. Usually the bride and groom, as well as the parents, all like to have a copy as they were too busy on the day to notice most of the stuff.


For candid photography, a 24-70mm wide-aperture lens is the regular workhorse. It works well in both natural and low-light environments, and can capture both close-up detail and the larger scene. If you use only one lens, go for a 24-70mm one.

Rather than using your camera's flash when shooting candidly, it's better to use a wide aperture and a moderate-to-high ISO setting to keep subjects sharp and focused. This way, the flash doesn't disturb your subjects, retaining a natural feel. For the same reason, you should turn off your camera's AF assist light.





Articles: Backlighting Photography Tips for Photo Magic - Ian Plant

My favourite style of shooting is against the light (known as contre-jour or backlighting). Backlighting in photography occurs when you point your camera directly toward a source of light, whether it be the sun, a street lamp, or a relatively bright portion of the scene. This effect causes the subject to be lit from behind, making its fringes seem to glow from within. When used properly, backlighting can help you create dramatic and mysterious photos.

Make It Glow

Anything translucent will appear to glow from within when backlit. In particular, subjects surrounded by fog, steam, dust, sea spray, and even falling snow can look magical in backlighting. During a photo trip to Namibia, the clear desert air there was perfect for contre-jour shooting, especially at sunrise and sunset when the light was most colourful. When I saw a trio of elephants heading my way at sunset, I selected a camera position designed to maximize my backlight opportunities. I photographed the elephants kicking up dust as they walked; the dust caught the warm light of the setting sun, giving the resulting image a colourful, mysterious look.

Expose with Care

The edges of backlit subjects, such as this snowy egret, glow with light, and often it is difficult to keep these areas from becoming overexposed. Do your best to avoid overexposing highlights, but if you cannot, set your exposure to ensure that important mid-tones have sufficient detail. For this shot of the egret, I was unable to avoid slightly overexposing the backlit fringes of the bird's white

feathers, so I chose an exposure that optimized exposure for the rest of the scene, ensuring an overall brightly lit and colourful photo.

Shade Your Lens to Prevent Flare

Flare, which results from light directly striking the front glass element of your lens, can be a significant challenge when shooting into the light, especially when the light source is very strong. Flare can reduce contrast, add strange colour casts, and even leave your images covered in unsightly "alien space ships" (oblong blobs of colour caused by excessive flare). It is typically possible to shade your lens from direct light striking the glass by using a lens hood, your hand, or something handy like a hat. Make sure you completely block the light, keeping the lens glass in shadow; just don't get your fingers in the shot!

For this image below of a charging grizzly bear, I chose to let the bear go into silhouette, retaining detail only in the fringe of its fur and the backlit water drops, resulting in a graphic, simplified, and mysterious presentation. Even though this is midday light, which conventional wisdom suggests is of limited utility for nature photography, backlighting nonetheless proves to be effective. I was careful to use my lens hood to prevent the light from directly striking the front element of my lens. The result is a crisp, sharp, and dramatically lit image.

Look for a Dark Background

Backlit subjects look best when juxtaposed against a dark background (usually another part of the scene which is in shade). For this photo of a rain forest, strong midday backlight created a dramatic rim light effect. The translucent moss-covered fringes of the trees seem to glow from within; I was able to enhance the effect by choosing a camera position which put a shadowed hillside behind the trees, making them seem to "pop" out of the background.

Shoot in Strong Light for Maximum Effect

Strong light is vital to getting the best backlighting – the stronger the light, the better the effect! For this image of one of the world-famous Chincoteague wild ponies, a clear horizon, free of clouds, haze, or any other obstruction, allowed bright, warm light to catch every translucent surface and set it on fire. This is precisely the look you should be aiming for!

Conclusion

Although backlighting presents a number of technical challenges, the results are well worth the effort. So the next time you're out taking pictures, start thinking of creative ways to shoot into the light!
