For those who aren't members, I have included a list of some of the benefits of being a member of the PSSA, plus a list of the fees involved. There is a once-off entrance fee as well as an annual subscription. Now is a really good time to join, because if you join between January and March, the subscription fee is halved as you only pay for 6 months' membership! So your initial outlay is lower than normal. But you are then in line to take advantage of the "early bird" discount at renewal time in June/July. It's really worth thinking about.

While talking about fees, this is just a reminder for the few that haven't yet paid their TPS subscription for this year. Please make your payments as soon as possible. At the same time, we understand that peoples' circumstances change, so if there are any who do not want to renew their membership, please help our admin and just drop Michael West a note via email or WhatsApp saying you won't be renewing. It really would be appreciated - thank you.

January saw the introduction of our new (or for the older members - the reversal back to the old) scoring system. I think it went off well and we will get used to it quickly. Just for your information, I did an analysis of all the images and scores for 2024, and then compared our January 2025 results to those. As no salon results were announced during January, the Special Images section at the end of the newsletter features the images that received a score of 13 at last month's competition.

General TPS news and information

January 2025 competition

Last month:

- **40** images were entered in the Set Subject category. The winning score was 14 (David Barnes winner-senior, and John Read runner-up-senior), with the average score being 10.6, and 11 being the most common score. A full list of the Set Subject scores can be found on our website by clicking *here*.
- **56** images were entered in the Open category. The winning score was 15 (Pieter Swart winner and judge's choice senior), with the average score being 10.7, and 11 being the most common score. A full list of the Open scores can be found on our website by clicking *here*.

Our judge for the month was Phil Sturgess, and he provided some good feedback on our images, even though he was a bit stricter than most of the judges we are used to.

Just to give you some comparison, last year we had a total of 885 images judged at our monthly competitions. Out of those, 348 (or 39,3%), received a score of 24 (this would be 12 under our new system) or more. This month, on competition night, we had 96 images judged, and only 22 of those (22.9%) received a score of 12 or more! So if you didn't get as many gold awards as normal. you're in good company!

Patterns and shapes

Definition

Patterns can be found everywhere – in nature and man-made constructions. They are made up of repeated objects, shapes, or colours and whether they're random or ordered can be very pleasing to the eye.

Textures are repetition of patterns, creating a uniform texture. Those patterns can be everything from curves to straight lines. When working with curves, circles and shapes, consistency in size and shape is what is important.

Extracts from the post: Join us in Struisbaai in August!)

The 2025 PSSA National Congress will be hosted by Cape Town Photographic Society (CTPS) in and around Struisbaai from 11-15 August. This will be to celebrate their 135th anniversary. Since Struisbaai is on our doorstep, we hope to welcome all of you there!

You can read more about the congress highlights and registration details here.

You'll probably ask why Struisbaai and why so early in August?

The patches of bright yellow canola interspersed with the rolling green Ruêns create unique scenic scapes, which can only be seen at that time of the year in the Overberg (the district surrounding Struisbaai). Because the farmers alternate the fields where they plant canola crops, the scapes will not be the same from year to year. Another bonus of timing the congress in August is that we are likely to have brooding cloudy skies – ideal for dramatic sea and landscape photography.

Struisbaai is a seaside village next to L'Agulhas (they flow into each other) which is the Southernmost point of the African continent, where the Indian and Atlantic oceans meet. Landmarks you'll want to photograph are the historic old lighthouse, wreck of the Meishi Maru, the southern point beacon, former Hotagterklip fishermen's cottages, (now national monuments), harbour with its resident giant stingray and across the bay, in Waenhuiskrans, the famous *cauldron* and cave and picturesque Kassiesbaai fishing community.


